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Exams: The X Factor with Dave Spencer

Teenage students usually spend more time doing internal and external tests and exams than any other group of learners. How can we prepare teenage students for exams but at the same time keep their motivation high? This session will suggest how and why we should find a balance between exam work and all the other useful, enjoyable activities that help to create well-rounded and keen learners of English. After looking at a few key theoretical issues, the session will focus on practical classroom activities and games, including attention to the development of oral skills to prepare for speaking exams.

In a changing world, with changing influences on students' behaviour, 21st century skills are vital in and beyond the classroom.

In this talk, we'll look at how teaching English contributes to the development of key competences such as critical thinking, decision making, showing empathy and teamwork. In addition, we'll work through a simple lesson structure that you can use to train life skills explicitly with your students.

The Underknown Skills of Classroom Management with Jim Scrivener

For many teachers, classroom management seems to be almost entirely about making groups, moving chairs and giving instructions. But there are many wonderful, easy-to-learn techniques (unknown or unused even by experienced teachers) that can transform a classroom by getting students engaged, interacting and really focussed on learning.

You will discover some techniques you may know well – but also others that are new to you – and which have the potential to completely alter the quality of your teaching and your students' learning.

Some of the techniques we'll look at are walking away, not rubberstamping, blank face, devil's advocate and intentional not hearing.



Grammar Games and Activities: Hi Tech, Low Tech, No Tech! with Dave Spencer

How important is grammar for our students? And how can we motivate our students to want to practise it and help them to learn it more efficiently? This session will aim to answer these questions and to suggest a number of practical games and activities that can help make grammar more enjoyable for you and your students. The activities will range from the exciting new idea of the Flipped Classroom, which can offer our teenage students a whole new dimension to learning grammar in the 21st Century, to classic games that need nothing but a blackboard and chalk!
